Executive Officer's Report

Who would have thought that after the 2020 Annual Report I would still be reporting on operating during Lockdown?! Here we are in 2021, out of lockdown and just getting back into events and school bookings.

I do feel very privileged to report that we still continued to thrive during the COVID Period. I understand that it was a very difficult time for the community and am glad that we were able to offer some reprieve from the sense of isolation many people experienced. The ECOSS Valley Market was a great place to purchase organic veggies, support local growers, but also connect incidentally which feedback says 'saved my sanity!' The Volunteers have kept on coming, keeping the place looking and feeling like a great place to be.

The highlight of our year was winning the 2 Premier's Sustainability Awards. One for Sustainable Places, and the other for Social and Economic Justice. This really gave us a boost with the recognition that we are focussing on something really valuable. It also acknowledged our volunteer Committee of Management and all the hours they invest in keeping the cogs turning in a great direction.

We have managed to keep 5 part time employees this year and employ lots of contractors for various jobs. Our Staff are a wonderfully cohesive team that are used to operating under the ever changing grant requirements and all assist in grant applications to fund their positions. We hope to attract some ethically minded Corporate Sponsors next year to reduce the stress of relying on grants and enable us to direct more energy towards getting on with our jobs.

We warmly welcomed Shlomit Moria - Bushwood Creations with her amazing wood carvings and The Dreaming Space Circus to the site. Another highlight has been the progression on UpCycles Hub, which will open soon offering a great youth and skill development space. It has been great to see the businesses on site get back to work post Covid restrictions, with the wonderful smell of chocolate emanating from Tonantzin, and the joy, laughter and thrills coming from the kids in the Dreaming Space Circus.

The Nursery is now an inviting space with an honesty box system for plants that is working well, lovingly tended by our all abilities Volunteers.

Overall the Circular Economy on site is actually working, from seed to harvest, donation and sale, we are starting to reap the benefits of years of work with the fruition of crops and infrastructure in place.

The vision before us, although a massive journey, is exciting with potential for growth and abundance.

We would like to thank all our supporters who have made this year so incredible.

President's Report

Another challenging year of lockdowns and restrictions but I am pleased to be able to say that ECOSS managed to function very positively through it all. Our weekly produce market run by Leanne Hall and volunteers was a stand-out community event' that gave people a Covid-safe outlet as well as providing local organic produce. We were also able to put on our annual Ecotopia Festival between lockdowns. This attracted its usual huge, delighted crowd. Our Crops for Community Program which involves all-abilities participants also continued on a restricted basis. These activities attracted a lot of new faces at ECOSS and solidified our position as a vibrant community hub. Unfortunately, of course, some events were cancelled due to lockdowns.

We are proud of the fact that our broad range of programs, events and activities with our emphasis on the environment and sustainability culminated in 2 Premier's Sustainability Awards – for 'Social and Economic Justice' and 'Sustainable Places'. As always at ECOSS there are several new projects developing or in the pipeline and these include a Youth Bike Hub and a Food Forest. We will see what 2022 brings!

None of this would be possible without the significant input of staff and Committee of Management. I would like to thank our staff for their outstanding commitment to the organisation and their invaluable teamwork. We are very fortunate as an organisation to attract the calibre of staff we have, Our Executive Officer, Chelsea McNab, Leanne Hall, Kylie Barnes, John Christie and Mel Daymond have all made significant contributions to the successful running of ECOSS during the year. ECOSS COMMUNITY

Another year of Covid restrictions made 2021 a challenging year but ECOSS remained vibrant in its offering of inclusive community events and programs. This solidified its status as a dynamic local community hub.

By definition the 'ECOSS Community' involves people and groups within the internal organisation as well as participants from the external community.

Staff and Committee

To start within the organisation, 2021 was another year where Committee of Management had to resort to Zoom meetings and staff spent a lot of time working from home. As in the previous year a lot was still achieved. The Committee of Management maintained their significant voluntary workload and their commitment to fulfilling the ECOSS vision. Staff, likewise, maintained existing programs and worked on developing new ones. Our Executive Officer, Chelsea McNab, has continued to develop new community connections and Leanne Hall has solidified the weekly market as a local popular fixture.

John Christie was employed at the start of 2021 as an integral staff member in the Crops for Community Program. He has extensive experience in Horticulture and in working with people with special needs. He and the other Crops for Community staff member, Mel Daymond, have worked very successfully with the all-abilities participants to grow and distribute food and establish the ECOSS nursery. Kylie Barnes has continued to maintain the Schools Program despite Covid restrictions and interest in the program has remained high, especially since lockdown finished.

Volunteers

Volunteers remained an important part of ECOSS' programs, especially in the Community Garden, the nursery, at the market, and as part of all the organisation's other events. Volunteers are always warmly welcomed and we would like to acknowledge their significant contribution.

Events, Participating Organisations

In 2021 some events were successfully run and others were cancelled. Ecotopia was held in the brief interlude between lockdowns. It was a very successful community event with visitors celebrating the opportunity to enjoy an event together. There were 3 Twilight Markets with music and lots of delicious food, a Moonlight Cinema and Permaculture Week events. There were also Clay Play sessions in the Pottery Studio and Tall Trees workshops in the school holidays as well as African Drumming classes between lockdowns. All of these events attracted enthusiastic visitors to ECOSS.

ECOSS received many benefits from the participation of the varied groups and organisations which became involved with us over the year. The RMIT Industrial Design students were committed to ECOSS during the year as they developed their final assessable projects based on programs and infrastructure plans at the ECOSS site. A Permaculture Design course was also run at ECOSS during the year and many of the students became interested and involved in the ECOSS Food Forest project. Similarly the groups which have long been meeting or working at ECOSS continued to make their valuable contribution to the organisation. These include Yarra Valley Bee Group, Warburton Environment, Cire Community School, Yarra Valley Landcare and Beans and Bananas Food Cooperative.

Co-locating Groups

ECOSS continues to have several environmentally minded tenants which add to our community. These include Bushwood Creations, Tonantzin Chocolate House, Judy Lay Felting, the Melganics organic vegetable stall, Tiny House 2 Go, the Dreaming Space and Silvertine Biodynamic Market Garden.

We continue to be significantly supported by Yarra Ranges Council. Cr Jim Child attends our Committee of Management meetings and Julian Guess is our Council ex-officio representative on Committee. They both make valuable contributions to the decisions and plans we make at ECOSS. The Council also supports ECOSS financially through grants and a Partnership Agreement.

We feel very fortunate as an organisation to have the involvement and support of a wide variety of community members and groups and we would like to thank them for being part of our ECOSS community.

The Valley Market ECOSS

After a challenging time throughout 2020 we are grateful to have been able to continue running The Valley Market ECOSS on a weekly basis. As it is an essential service it has meant we were able to continue throughout the extended lockdowns.

The Market has continued throughout 2021 with great success! It has seen ongoing support from the local community as well as the continuation of wonderful fresh produce being available directly to the community.

We have had a number of Twilight markets - aiming to hold a different Twilight Market for each season. The Twilight Markets have provided live music and much needed respite and entertainment to the extended community! This seemed to be essential to people's well being and sense of belonging within the community. For our Autumn Twilight Market we had an all female line up with Chloe Amberfox and The Jam Tarts performing.

In November 2021 thank you to Yarra Ranges Council and The Art Attack program we were able to host an African Themed Twilight Market! We had a large number of stalls, African Music and dancing enjoyed by people of all ages! Including our very own resident Yarra Valley Drummers! This was then followed up by a Christmas Twilight Market in December, another wonderful evening enjoyed by all!
















KEY PROGRAMS

The number of key programs at ECOSS have increased again this year reaching more people both in the local community and beyond. The variety of initiatives have attracted diverse audiences via events, workshops, schools projects and celebrations.

Crops for Community - John Christie

The Crops For Community (CFC) programme has achieved many of its stated aims over the course of the last year despite the many difficulties surrounding the COVID pandemic and extended lockdowns. I joined the programme in April and quickly found the programme to be well-designed and progressing along the path laid out. My role was to bring some horticultural and educational expertise to the growing of the crops and the setting up of experiences for our allability volunteers. Working closely with Mel Daymond we began by renovating the old community garden after it had been abandoned during the long lock down. The first stage involved getting the composting system up and running again and soil amelioration works in the many beds. Redesign work for the community garden area is an ongoing discussion but we decided to wait and watch, utilising the space through the year and carefully mapping out what improvements, if any, could be made; this partly to expand the productive area and partly to utilise existing structures and spaces more efficiently. As part of this contemplation two trial beds were placed outside the compound on the eastern side. Improvements during 2022 are planned.

Continued lock downs meant many of our volunteers were no longer able to access ECOSS but we still had a core group that fell within the 5 km limit and who were allowed to come under the regulations. As a result, the gardening activities were on a relatively small scale. We were still able to grow produce to donate to Koha and Oonah during those times when they were operating and we were able to deliver. Some produce was retained by us to value add through a cooking programme and we were able to sell curries and other food items at the various markets held by ECOSS with all funds being returned to CFC. The other major development was to re-invigorate the poly tunnel closest to the heart of operations at ECOSS. This meant we had a great opportunity to extend the germinating and growing times of targeted plants. Joe, through her contacts with the Carawah nursery, organised to source tube stock which the volunteers were able to transplant into bigger pots, grow on and then sell at a nursery area set up at the rear of the poly tunnel. Payment is through an honesty box which allows us to generate income even when we are not around. This proved to be very successful. Periodic stocktake matched with income generated suggests this is working as it should. Discussions concerning the possibility of expanding this to include indigenous stock with seed and cuttings sourced by us as part of the programme are ongoing. We are often asked about whether we have indigenous stock for sale, especially with the growth of new residents to the area. It would seem to be a natural extension to what we are already doing. Expansion into other areas including fire-retardant plants, pollinator plants, small bird attracting plants etc. will be explored through the coming year.

A CFC DL pamphlet was created to advertise and inform about the programme. We began a iNaturalist account to log the biodiversity encountered at ECOSS as an extension activity for the volunteers and as a means of educating about the interconnectedness of the garden with the wider ecosystem.

The main thing learnt over the course of the year was how much potential there is to continue to expand this programme. The output of produce grown could be raised, the experiences for our volunteers can be broadened and deepened. The numbers of volunteers and their carers able to access the programme could be increased. The list of plants propagated along targeted lines could be expanded and relationships with Landcare and Council in this space as well as other related organisations could be enhanced.

KEY PROGRAMS CONTINUED

Practical Earth Education Program 2021 - Kylie Barnes

The ECOSS Practical Earth Education Program continued in 2021 between the lockdowns as and when it was possible. With an exciting start it was wonderful to be able to welcome students back on site. We had to adapt to unfolding conditions as the year progressed. We look forward to being able to offer a much more full program as restrictions ease and schools and community groups are able to attend more excursions again in 2022.

Yarra Ranges Council funded some Autumn school holiday programs for children and families where participants learnt about the Tall Trees of our water catchment area. There was also an Autumn Treasure Hunt and Nature Art session.

Sophia Mundi Steiner School bought their entire high school, years 7-12, for a big day of learning about Sustainability and environmental processes. Students began with a tour of ECOSS, and then worked in groups participating in earth building workshops, biodynamic farming, biofilitration systems and bush regeneration. They visited as part of their start of year camp.

Ghilgai school came with their class 3 and 4 students to learn about Indigenous culture and also learnt how to do some basket weaving with a local indigenous artist.

Hoddles Creek Primary school visited for a number of excursions to learn about indigenous culture with local indigenous artist, Nikki Browne. They returned a number of times to learn about sustainable gardening, an ECOSS Discovery Tour and also came for a Nature Art and Upcycling session as well as a Pottery workshop.

Billanook College attended a full day program with their grade 4 students and worked on the biodynamic farm, learnt about composting in the community garden, had a tour and created some Nature art.

Edmund Rice Camp Victoria bought students of all ages for some Nature Art Sessions in the Autumn school holidays.

The Melbourne Adventure Hub brought many groups of Year 9 students from some schools from the city as part of their camp program. The students participated in a number of sustainable earth building projects as well as farming, composting, bush regeneration, biofiltration and nature art.

Kylie presented at the online Learning for Sustainability conference run by the Eastern Alliance for Sustainable Learning. This was a great day and a wonderful opportunity to network with other sustainability educators.

The Warburton Primary School Time Out Tipi project, supported in partnership with the Yarra Ranges Council, was able to be completed in Term 4. It was lovely to see the children playing in the space they co-designed and created in collaboration with YRC, and ECOSS facilitators Kylie and Jane.

We were grateful that the Yarra Ranges Council extended their grant to support the education program as it was unable to run to its full potential during lockdowns. This means that the remainder of the funds can be used in 2022 to offer a discount to school and community group excursions and education programs.

We were happy to partner with Re-think Recycling Coop to begin collecting bottle lids that would otherwise end up in landfill to be repurposed into innovative recycled plastic products. We have established a bottle lid collection point at ECOSS for the community to contribute to creating more recycling opportunities and reducing problem waste in landfill.

Although there were many cancellations due to the pandemic restrictions, we are hoping that many schools and groups will reschedule in future and look forward to continuing to offer inspiring, practical educational experiences at ECOSS.

All Abilities Program - Melanie Daymond

A big thank you to all our volunteers, their support workers and the organisations that support our Crops for Community to Market program. With their time and dedication it is now a thriving, inclusive community and skills building program.

We value each individual, Melba Support Services, Interchange Outer East and Recovery Options for their partnerships.

Again, even during the 2021 restrictions we were happy to be able to continue to have our existing All Abilities volunteers work in the community garden on a one on one basis. Our community garden was well cared for and it was delightful to see after the restrictions were lifted how wonderful and loved it all looked. They kept the garden thriving during these difficult times, as well as throughout the year.

ENVIRONMENT & SUSTAINABILITY

Our on-going environmental and sustainable projects are our priority. All activities and training on site must have a sustainable element as we attempt to engage the community and all ECOSS visitors in working towards a greener future.

We support the Yarra Ranges Council Climate Emergency Declaration With Sustainability at the CORE of everything we do on site.

Our environmental values and purpose are central and embedded in all of our programmes and activities, they are at the heart of what we do and who we are.

Food security is becoming a more pressing issue for our local and global communities and is a growing focus for ECOSS. Food shortages are an increased problem across the globe. In 2021 many global issues affected the transportation and access to food, including:

- -the global Covid 19 pandemic and all social, economic and health problems which followed.
- -increased impacts from climate change including more extreme weather events such as storms, floods, fires and difficult growing conditions.

The Aims of Food Security are to have less reliance on transport for food access, grow food locally, reduce our impacts on the earth (particularly carbon emissions) and make nutritious, affordable food available to all.

At ECOSS we are committed to supporting and demonstrating food security initiatives, examples of these in 2021 include:

The Food Forest

ECOSS is working with Permaculture Yarra Valley to design a food forest onsite. This food forest will be established on one acre of land between the Coop building and Slivertine Farm. It will rely on and grow through community members and volunteers being directly involved in the propagation, planting, mentorship, stewardship, harvesting and potentially swapping and cooking of the produce. The vision is that the Food Forest will become a beautiful, abundant forest which inspires visitation, learning, wellbeing, community resilience and future proofing.

Crops for Community

All abilities programs continued to propagate, grow and harvest vegetables from the community garden. Produce is also donated to food charities.

The Valley Market ECOSS

The ongoing success of The ECOSS Valley Market has increased the local resident's opportunity to buy locally grown produce and handmade/artisan goods. This includes selling locally made organic bread and chocolate products using sustainably sourced cacao.

Silvertine Farm

A biodynamic farm onsite. They sell their produce at the ECOSS Valley Market and supply Beans and Bananas food cooperative.

Beans and Bananas Food Cooperative

Beans and Bananas Food operates fortnightly onsite-providing community members the opportunity to get involved in packing wholesale (onsite, local and otherwise) organic, food boxes and receiving affordable produce in return.

The Chicken Run

The chicken run within the Heritage Fruit Orchard continues to fertilise the orchard and provide local eggs, which are happily collected and used by the all-abilities groups.

Organic demonstration vineyard

The vineyard is growing well, is virus-free and will be used in pruning demonstrations next year.

ENVIRONMENT & SUSTAINABILITY CONTINUED

Sustainable Enterprises

The sustainable enterprises co-locating at ECOSS provide opportunities for sustainable living exhibits and education. They also provide solutions to difficult social and environmental justice issues of our time. For instance, demonstrating affordable/sustainable/small footprint housing options, re-using timber to create art, sustainably sourced cacao, organically and biodynamically grown vegetables (decreasing the use of toxic, insecticides and pesticides), propagation of native plants.

Zero Waste and Reducing Landfill

ECOSS used the Wash Against Waste (a kit of reusable cups, bowls, plates and cutlery) as much as possible in day to day use. However, with the pandemic, it wasn't always possible to safely use the kit for events and markets, and compostable options were used and composted in the ECOSS composting system. This resulted in ECOSS creating very little landfill waste onsite. The Wash Against Waste system was also hired out throughout the year by a number of individuals and organisations, reducing further waste in the community.

Earth Education

In all our education sessions we aim to acknowledge the traditional owners of the land past/present and emerging and recognise that there is still a lot we can learn about how they managed the land.

Environmental education is central to ECOSS's mission. The Practical Earth Education program which ran tours and education sessions with school children in 2021, shared crucial environmental principles about how to care for the earth, tend to the soil, grow/harvest food, build sustainable homes, live simply and understand the importance of healthy ecosystems, for all life.

Native Forest Protection Advocacy/ Activism

Warburton Environment continue to base themselves at ECOSS, holding meetings, participating in earth education about our endangered local plants and animals and holding information stalls. During this period, they have (working closely with WOTCH, Kinglake Greater Glider, and other environmental groups) protected native forests in and around Big Pats Creek, Warburton and Mt Bride through legal action, focusing on the endangered Tree Geebung (Persoonia arborea) and Greater Glider. They have worked closely with indigenous leaders to advocate for the protection of our local native forests from logging. They held the Tall Trees Festival in August as a successful online event which raised a lot of money for the court case. They are planning for the 2022 festival to take place on site at ECOSS.

Environmental Initiatives with Yarra Ranges Council

ECOSS worked with the Yarra Ranges Council on some environmental initiatives including; the solar farm meeting and planning, planting from the 'Ribbons of Green' project, Biochar educational opportunities.

A NOTE FROM OUR CO-LOCATORS

Silvertine Farm

Silvertine Farm is still growing good healthy vegetables. It is now our 6th year and we are still finding new and hopefully better ways to farm.

We grow around 40 varieties of vegetables and sell them at The Valley market at ECOSS and The Eltham Farmers Market.

Tonantzin Chocolate

Fernando has opened a beautiful and delicious traditional Mexican chocolate factory at ECOSS. Tonantzin Chocolate are keen to share their cultural knowledge and offer Traditional Sweat Lodges and Cacao Ceremonies. ECOSS is happy to support the sharing of healthy traditional practices that nurture and educate the community.

Vines at ECOSS

Peter Preuss has established a small vineyard at ECOSS to demonstrate organic grape growing techniques and exemplify the benefits of a unique grape variety - the Amazing Roohoodler. Roohoodler has proven to be extraordinarily disease resistant and the variety provides enormous potential from social, educational, financial, and certainly environmental perspectives as it requires little or no chemical disease prevention.

The Roohoodler grapevines at ECOSS have settled in well and even produced a small crop this year. The wine should be ready for drinking by August. There are still plenty of rooted cuttings for those that would like to plant this unique, disease resistant variety in their own backyards... just talk to Peter and Janet at any Friday Markets.

Yarra Valley Bee Group

The popular local group was unable to meet during the lockdowns but have continued to care for the hives at ECOSS and attend the Valley Market to sell honey. They also run educational sessions and attend ECOSS events, offering important information about bees.

Bushwood Creations

Shlomit Moria, local chainsaw artist, loves creating in her space at ECOSS and feels so grateful to be able to come into such a beautiful place everyday and be part of the lovely community. She held an open studio in December which was a wonderful experience and opportunity to share her work with the community. She has been busy working on commissions for various councils and projects.!'

TREASURER'S REPORT

Annual Financial Report for the 12 month period ending 31st December 2021.

The Treasurer and Committee of Management members submit the financial report of Yarra Valley ECOSS Inc. for the financial year ended 31 December 2021.

2021 was the first year that our financial year covered the period from the 1st of January to the 31st December calendar year. It was also again, a year impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. Like most organisations and businesses across the country, Yarra Valley ECOSS was again thrown into uncertainty, knowing that the Federal government's JobKeeper program would be finishing at the end of March 2021 and we could no longer rely on this funding to buffer the financial impact of further lockdowns that would eventuate later in 2021. Fortunately, we started the year with a healthy balance sheet and had secured other grant funding across 2020, which assisted us greatly, as we navigated through the ups and downs of 2021.

Just like in 2020, we were locked down at various times, at which our staff transitioned back to working from home. Our usual activities were curtailed and there were again lengthy periods of time when there weren't many people on site. This time, we were financially supported by the Victorian State government through Business Victoria and also received COVID-19 support through Yarra Ranges Council. Thanks to these business support programs, we were able to keep Yarra Valley ECOSS running, support our staff, meet our overheads and maintain our balance sheet over a difficult period.

We are extremely grateful for the generous support from Yarra Ranges Council and from the Victorian State government. This support has meant that Yarra Valley ECOSS can continue with various infrastructure projects, continue to expand our activities and be there to support the community.

Principal Activities

The principal activities of the association during the financial year have not altered.

Significant Changes

No significant change in the nature of these activities occurred during the year.

Operating Result

The profit (loss) for 2021 (12 months) amounted to \$84,144. In 2019-20 (18 months): \$42,793.

Income from Grants, Partnerships, Sponsorships & Donations

In the 12-month period ending 31st December 2021, Yarra Valley ECOSS received extremely generous support from the Victorian government of \$48,400 through the Business Victoria, Business Costs Assistance Program. Separate to this,

Yarra Valley ECOSS obtained a further \$158,431 in grants, and \$7,147 in donations and sponsorships from various sources. We also continue to receive considerable ongoing support from our partner organisations, especially Yarra Ranges Council. They have been extremely generous in providing us with numerous grants including the renewal of the annual Connected & Healthy Communities partnership agreement funding until 2023 and the annual Creative Communities partnership agreement for our Ecotopia Junction Festival until 2023. We also received funding from Council to again hold the Ngulu Festival that honours our First Nations people, which unfortunately had to be cancelled in 2021 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Yarra Ranges Council provided funding towards an upgrade of the power infrastructure at the ECOSS site. We also received a grant through the Yarra Ranges Council Enhancing Existing Partnership Program to employ a Volunteer & Engagement Officer, which has been invaluable in increasing the number of volunteers on site and to engage with schools and other stakeholders. Yarra Ranges Council also funded various smaller grants to provide music and children's activities at our weekly market and to run Governance training for the committee of management and staff.

Our Crops for Community program received grants from Vic Health Reimaging Health, the Hugh Williamson Foundation, FRRR Grants for Resilience & Wellness, Yarra Ranges Council Grants for Community & Community Development, ANZ Seeds for Renewal Program through FRRR and the NAB Foundation Community Grant Program, which will allow the program to continue to the end of 2022.

Upper Yarra Community Enterprise Limited (Bendigo Community Bank branches at Warburton and Yarra Junction) provided a \$16,000 grant for the refurbishment of our Community kitchen.

It is interesting to note that we were successful in 90% of the applications that we submitted, which is a testament to the hard working efforts of all our staff.

Rental income

Silvertine Farm, Yarra Valley Community Pottery Studio, Tiny House 2 Go, Bushwood Creations, Tonantzin Chocolate and Judy Lay (craft and felting) continued as tenants on the ECOSS site. In 2021, we welcomed Melganics, an organic fruit & vegetable supplier and The Dreaming Space Circus.

Regular users of our site were the Yarra Valley Bee Group, Permaculture Yarra Valley, Beans & Bananas Co-Op, Kofi Kunpke African Drumming and Tipi Ceremony. Our bookings for The Coop, our large multi-purpose space and our Schools program were severely restricted due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Our rental and school program activities in 2021 brought in a combined income of \$42,022, which was an increase of \$8,185 from the 18-month period previously reported.

Auspicing

We were able to auspice the following grants over the 2021 year. This helped community organisations to obtain funds to undertake community and sustainability projects and to run various activities and events.

Future income

The ongoing financial aim of Yarra Valley ECOSS has always been to become financially sustainable. We aim to generate sufficient income from all our various activities to be able to pay our ongoing wages and operational expenses and undertake further projects and activities for the benefit of our community. Thanks to the Business Victoria support we received over this pandemic affected year, we were able to weather a second year severely impacted by lockdowns and restrictions. This means we have managed to maintain a healthy balance sheet, which will enable us to now shift our focus to new projects as restrictions ease and we can move forward with our goals and visions. Our focus for the coming financial year will again be to keep applying for grants, which together with our rental income will allow us to keep providing opportunities for the community to engage with and be part of Yarra Valley ECOSS.

Thank you again as always, to Catherine Aulich our bookkeeper, who has worked tirelessly and provided invaluable support throughout the year.
